Next, it's time to spread the word! Social media platforms are a big help, of course, but you should definitely supplement that with other approaches, including invitations to a planning session. If you aren't sure where to begin, you can create personalized invitation designs for every occasion using free templates, which you can customize to suit your needs. Just make sure your invitations contain eye-catching photos and all the location and contact information necessary.

Open a Food Pantry in Your Community

Food insecurity is a growing issue in the U.S. and abroad. Cargill notes that starting a food pantry or food shelf will allow you to <u>serve the underprivileged in your community</u>. Start by creating a nonprofit, writing down bylaws detailing your operations: how your organization is governed, how often you will hold board meetings, your voting process, and the rules on conflicts of interest, which are required when you <u>hold a 501(c)(3) status</u>.
